

Jetty Island Cleanup.

Why: Marine litter is ugly and threatens people, birds, fish, and marine mammals. Here are some fun facts:

- Each year millions of birds, turtles, fish, & marine mammals are killed after getting tangled in marine debris or ingesting plastics - their habitat can be damaged or destroyed
- Swimmers & divers can become entangled in abandoned nets & fishing lines.
- Beach users are injured by stepping on broken glass, cans, needles, & other litter.
- 80% of marine litter comes from land-based sources: beach users, storm runoff, landfills, solid waste, debris carried in rivers & streams, poorly maintained garbage bins, & litterbugs.
- Marine debris is a navigational hazard for fishing & recreational boats - entangling propellers & clogging intake valves.

Regardless of how trash gets into the water, we invite you to join us to 'Un-splash that Trash' and make a positive impact on our recreational and boating environment!

Adopt-a-Street: Our next clean-up for the Marine View Drive in Everett is anticipated for this fall. This is a fun and a rewarding way to give back to our community, and to catch up with boating friends while we make this slice of Everett cleaner. Weather and the waters of the Pacific Northwest. I had the pleasure of enjoying a cruise to Alaska aboard the Viking Orion. Orion was a very nice ship that even had a planetarium on board. As nice as the cruise was, I spent a lot of the time wishing I was there on my own boat in control of my itinerary. As with many cruises, most of the beautiful scenery passed by at night and we spent our days in ports surrounded by mobs of people from other cruise ships. However, there were some smaller ports where we were the only ship there, and ours was only 950 passengers. Of course, I nerded out on the Bridge and engine control room tours, and the docking experience. Watching how the ship comes in and gets tied up to the pier was a real thrill for me. But all of that left me determined to spend some time cruising Canada and Alaska at the helm of my own boat. It's a goal.

As a result of being away on the cruise for two weekends this summer, we've only been out a few times. Only once have we really been outside of Deception Pass, and that was headed up to Anacortes, so we haven't even crossed Rosario Strait. That said, fewer trips have not left me short of *The Pike Pole* content, and it's becoming very common that I'm somehow at the center of the learning experience. As some of you know, I'm breaking in a new first mate. I'm finding so far that I'm not very good at it. While it's hard to put a finger on why I'm struggling, I think it's primarily a failure to clearly communicate, and perhaps that's because I don't have a plan, and I'm assuming certain things are intuitive when they are not. It certainly makes me think about Partner in Command training, and how some of what's taught there could help. Thankfully she is taking the Boat Handling class, so there's hope. More importantly, she's open to learn and participate in our boating experiences.

I'll save some of our experiences for another article, but I'll share the experience we had on our first trip together. The weekend that we were supposed to go to Spencer Spit, everyone else cancelled, so we pivoted and went to Poulsbo. We anchored out on Friday night and I had the pleasure of dealing with my anchor line getting knotted up and jammed in my windless. It was fairly late and luckily I had enough line out for the conditions, so I left it to deal with in the morning. That was mostly because during the process I had jammed a finger in the windless and needed to get a kiss to make it feel better. I did get it freed in the morning and the rest of the weekend was uneventful, until the end of the trip.

My usual approach to going into Dagmars is to hand over the helm once we clear the bridge to prepare the fenders and lines. It happened that we were coming in at low tide, I think still below a -1.0 tide. I pointed to the chart plotter and said keep it in the white marking the channel. That was my mistake, because I didn't tell her that my chart is oriented north up, and we were moving south at the time. We were already on the right side of the channel, and when the boat started drifting out, she turned the wrong way to come back in. I think I've set you up for what happened, but needless to say we ended up in the mud. Thankfully, the only thing damaged was my ego, and we got unstuck quickly. I say that I failed to clearly communicate, but in my defense, I did point to the shallow spot in the river and said "don't go there". I will say that, as the captain of the boat, it was my responsibility to make sure that all communications were clear and the person at the helm had enough information and experience to safely pilot the boat, so that's on me. On the upside, she's run aground, so she's now a true boater.

I hope everyone has had a safe, productive, and enjoyable summer, and I look forward to sharing more of my experiences training my new mate and learning to be a better trainer.

ADVANCED GRADES

Boat Handling: How the heck do I get this boat to do what I want?

Marine Navigation (aka Piloting): How to get from here to there without running into something.

Advanced Marine Navigation (aka Advanced Piloting):

Navigation under more difficult circumstances while using electronic tools, especially GPS all the while taking wind and currents into account.

Off-shore Navigation (aka Junior Navigation or JN): When off-shore there are no longer landmarks for reference; we must substitute celestial objects such as the sun.

Celestial Navigation (aka Navigation or N): The final navigation course focuses on sextant use---for when all your electronics fail!

ELECTIVES

Cruising and Cruise Planning: You're going on a two-week cruise in Canada – what do I take? Customs? Forbidden fruits & veggies? What if I get hurt? We answer all these questions and more!

Engine Maintenance: Diesel, gasoline, spark plugs, pistons, fuel mixtures, . . and how they all work together to get you where you're going.

Instructor Development (ID): Want to teach a course? We'll show you how! Open only to members.

Marine Electrical Systems (MES): There is one system on the boat and one that you plug into at the dock, which is which? Marine Communications Systems (MCS): It can be a matter of life or death to be able to communicate with the first responders. We teach you how to make a SOS call and more.

SEVEN DOWN AND ONE TO GO!!

This year we've jumped in to <u>Boating Safety 4 Kids</u> lessons. We've participated in seven events so far this year. This could be a record. We will add it all up at the end of the year.

FEBRUARY

<u>Seattle Boat Show</u> 50-minute seminar on the first Saturday of February. We had helpers from the district and were very happy to have them. We had Marie McBride, from Bremerton and Jim West, Gary and Darcy Baker, Brian Rachal and "PFD Seagull" Linda Martin from Everett. There were eight kids in attendance, along with their parents, so we had an engaged audience.

APRIL

<u>April Pool's Day</u> at Mountlake Terrace Pool. We had helpers Claire Greer as an Octopus, Greg Nelson as a Shark, Cathy Rich and "PFD Seagull" Linda Martin all from Everett. We taught 40 kids and their parents all about life jackets and cold-water danger. Kids received either a Snoopy color book or a Side Kick activity book.

MAY

This was a nice surprise. Thanks to our Commander Annette Ferguson we got back into **Cabela's in Marysville**. We did a Saturday afternoon activity using a real boat. What fun that was! Our helpers were Greg Nelson the Shark, Claire the Octopus and "PFD Seagull" Linda Martin. We taught 20 kids in four hours and their parents too. Kids were given a Snoopy Color Book. Added bonus: Annette's son, Scott, who works at Cabela's, taught the families about hiking in the PNW and recommended safety items sold in the store.

JUNE

First, we went to the <u>District 16 Rendezvous</u> in Port Ludlow and set up a table next to the pond with life jackets, rescue line toss and cold-water activity. Our helpers were Claire Greer the Octopus, Cathy Rich the Crab and "PFD Seagull" Linda Martin. We reached out to 12 people as they walked by and they all participated in our activities. Second, Cdr Annette Ferguson and I drove to the <u>Fawn Lake Community</u> event near Shelton. They were having a special event to thank the South Mason County Fire and Rescue for putting up a life jacket loaner station and supplying it with new life jackets. P/C Renee Olson, who lives on the lake, invited us to help educate the children of the community on water safety. Renee, her son, Josh, and a neighbor boy, Cohen, taught Uncle (Louie) Josh fishing story and Annette, and I did the Life Jacket Style Show. There were 18 kids and 22 adults in attendance. All were given one of our new Red Rescue Whistles and a Snoopy Color Book. Third, Cathy Rich and I taught at <u>Nancy's Noah's Ark Child Care Center</u> in Mill Creek. There were 51 kids and six teachers. They learned all about life jackets and played the "It's in the Box" game. The kids were given a Snoopy color book and crayons and the teachers were given the PFD Puzzle Storybook.

JULY

<u>Kid's Fest</u> in Mill Creek, on Saturday July 26, was very well attended. We had 97 kids with their parents and grandparents come through our booth for the Life Jacket Lesson, Buckles in the Ice Chest and using use of the Rescue Bag to save the parent who "fell overboard". The helpers were Jim West, Linda Martin the Seagull, Greg Nelson the Shark, Joellyn Jackson and P/C Renee Olson from Shelton. The first 25 kids who had their own life jacket got a rescue whistle. Every kid got a sticker and a Sidekick Activity Book.

SEPTEMBER Upcoming

Fishermen's Fall Festival. at Fisherman's Terminal, Seattle on September 13 from 11am – 6pm Life jackets, cold water and rescue line toss at a booth. Kids receive a Puzzle Storybook. The next adventurer on our way to Port Townsend was anchoring in Port Ludlow. A lovely area where we enjoyed


a great dinner in the hotel and breakfast the next morning.
