



Greetings fellow mariners! We have some updates for outreach/outings of this past month and for events coming up soon.

Adopt-a-Street: Our Fall clean-up for the Marine View Drive in Everett was Saturday, October 18th with the group meeting at 9:00 AM. As it usually is, this was a fun and rewarding way to give back to our community. If you missed this opportunity keep an eye on the calendar in The Pike Pole for the next clean-up. If you are interested in participating for some fun, exercise and good company, please contact/Danny or Claire.

Jetty Island Clean-up: As last month's newsletter was going to print, following the conclusion of the September 27 District 16 Fall Conference, an intrepid group from the Snohomish County Club crossed the Raging Main (OK, the Snohomish River) in two of our Squadron Members' boats to land on the island for an end-of-season litter and debris removal from the shores and uplands of Jetty Island. We had a great outing and found the area relatively clean, yet in keeping with our day's mission, we still managed to leave the island a little cleaner than how we found it.

Boating in Colder Fall Weather: Staying Safe in Chilly Waters. Last month's article shared some recommendations for preparing your vessel to endure the winter months. For those who choose to extend your enjoyment of boating during our cold season in the PNW, Fall preparations take on another dimenson. For the adventurous, cold-weather boating can offer solitude, beautiful winter landscapes, and less crowded waterways. This enjoyment also comes with its own set of challenges, however and diligence is key. Cold-water boating demands extra preparation, knowledge, and respect for the elements. Here's what you need to know to stay safe and enjoy your time on the water during the colder months.

Dress for Survival, Not Just Comfort. When boating in cold weather, it's critical to dress appropriately. Unlike summer boating, cold conditions require specialized clothing to ensure safety:

- Layering: Start with moisture-wicking base layers to keep sweat off your skin, followed by insulating layers to retain warmth, and a waterproof outer layer to block wind and water.
- **Avoid Cotton:** Cotton holds moisture and loses insulation properties when wet. Stick to materials like wool, fleece, or synthetics that retain heat even when damp.
- **PFDs:** Always wear a life jacket, ideally one designed for cold-weather use. These often include extra thermal protection, making them essential in preventing hypothermia if you fall overboard. (Pro Tip): Consider investing in a survival suit or dry suit, which provides full-body thermal protection and is buoyant. These suits are essential for those boating in areas with frigid water temperatures.

The Threat of Cold-Water Immersion. Falling into cold water can be deadly. Understanding the body's response to coldwater immersion can help boaters react effectively in an emergency:

- Cold Shock Response: Upon falling into cold water, your body may react with an involuntary gasp reflex, which can cause you to inhale water. This is often followed by hyperventilation and loss of muscle control.
- **Hypothermia:** Prolonged exposure to cold water reduces body temperature. Hypothermia can set in quickly and be fatal if not addressed promptly. It's important to know the signs: shivering, confusion, slurred speech, and loss of coordination.
- Remember the "1-10-1" Rule: This survival rule is helpful for boaters: you have 1 minute to control your breathing after falling into cold water, 10 minutes of meaningful muscle use to self-rescue, and 1 hour before hypothermia becomes life-threatening. (Helpful practice): Practice cold-water survival techniques with your crew so everyone knows what to do if someone goes overboard.

Equipment and Vessel Preparation. Your boat and gear need to be up to the task of winter conditions. Key considerations:

- Check the Weather: In colder months, weather can be more unpredictable. Make sure you check multiple forecasts and be ready to alter plans if conditions look dangerous.

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



Fellow Mariners,

I guess that stings a bit after the M's heartbreaking loss in game 7 of the ALCS. Oh well...At least they made it that far. Of course, this means we've made it to the end of October and well into the Puget Sound rainy season. This typically means that I'm talking about end of season maintenance, and/or winterizing, but we're not there yet, or at least I'm not. In my last article I mentioned generating a lot of content this season, and most of it was at my expense in several ways. So here's another episode of what not to do...or learning from your SEO's mistakes. Clearly, I should be fired and given remedial training.

We ended the last episode having safely made it back through Deception Pass in the dark feeling a little worn from the rough seas, but breathing a sigh of relief for being in smoother water. We headed into Cornet Bay and headed toward the dock. By then it was completely dark and there was no light from the moon. As it turns out there's not much, if any, light on the dock as well. To top that off, anyone that's been in Cornet Bay overnight knows that there are several boats anchored long term with no anchor light. I'm not sure what came over me, but I was determined to tie up to the dock rather than anchor. We're still trying to figure out how to work together, while my new first mate is learning basic boating skills, and I'm constantly reminded that I shouldn't assume what's obvious to me is clear to others.

My first attempt at getting the boat to the dock was actually perfect, but the wind was off the dock and we drifted away as my first mate stood on the swim platform trying to decide what to do. Boat Handling: How the heck do I get this boat to do what I want?

Marine Navigation (aka Piloting): How to get from here to there without running into something.

Advanced Marine Navigation (aka Advanced Piloting):

Navigation under more difficult circumstances while using electronic tools, especially GPS all the while taking wind and currents into account.

Off-shore Navigation (aka Junior Navigation or JN): When off-shore there are no longer landmarks for reference; we must substitute celestial objects such as the sun.

Celestial Navigation (aka Navigation or N): The final navigation course focuses on sextant use---for when all your electronics fail!

ELECTIVES

Cruising and Cruise Planning: You're going on a two-week cruise in Canada – what do I take? Customs? Forbidden fruits & veggies? What if I get hurt? We answer all these questions and more!

Engine Maintenance: Diesel, gasoline, spark plugs, pistons, fuel mixtures, . . and how they all work together to get you where you're going.

Instructor Development (ID): Want to teach a course? We'll show you how! Open only to members.

Marine Electrical Systems (MES): There is one system on the boat and one that you plug into at the dock, which is which? Marine Communications Systems (MCS): It can be a matter of life or death to be able to communicate with the first responders. We teach you how to make a SOS call and more.

Electronic Navigation Systems (ENS):

Radar for Boaters: The systems used to navigate by on the boat are changing as we speak. Learn now before they crihange.

Sail: What are all those lines and gadgets for? Are you sure the wind will blow me where I want to go?

Weather: Look to the clouds, wind and temperature for safe boating weather.

- **Battery Maintenance:** Cold temperatures can affect your boat's battery performance. Ensure your battery is fully charged and carry a backup if possible.

- Fuel Management: Engines may need longer warm-up times, and cold weather can affect fuel consumption, so plan for extra fuel to avoid running out on the water.
- **Partial Winterizing Your Boat**: Even when you're actively boating, partial winterization can help prevent damage. Flush your engine with antifreeze and check that bilge pumps are working efficiently to prevent freezing.

(Pro Tip): Carry a toolkit and extra supplies such as blankets, flares, emergency rations, and a portable heater for unexpected breakdowns.

Know the Signs of Ice Formation. In regions prone to freezing, ice can be a serious hazard. Whether you're boating in a coastal area or an inland lake, knowing how to navigate around ice is crucial:

- **Spotting Ice Hazards:** Look for patches of smooth, glassy water, which may indicate thin layers of ice. If you notice ice forming on your vessel, it's a sign that temperatures are dangerously low.
- **Avoiding Ice:** Always maintain a safe distance from ice floes or edges, as they can damage your hull. In some cases, you may need to plan an alternate route or head back to shore sooner than planned.

(Pro Tip): Never break through ice with your boat. Even small impacts can cause significant damage and put your vessel at risk of sinking.

Emergency Preparedness and Communication. Staying connected and prepared for emergencies is critical during cold-weather boating:

- VHF Radio and GPS: Ensure your VHF radio is working properly and keep it within easy reach. A GPS or chart plotter is equally important for tracking your position, especially in low visibility conditions.
- File a Float Plan: Always inform someone on shore of your route and expected return time. This simple step can save precious time in the event of an emergency.
- First Aid Kit and Emergency Blankets: Pack a well-stocked first aid kit with items for treating cold exposure, such as thermal blankets and chemical heat packs. It's also a good idea to include extra food and water, as cold-weather conditions may delay rescue times. (Pro Tip): Consider carrying a Personal Locator Beacon (PLB), which sends a distress signal to emergency responders via satellite if you're in trouble.

While cold-weather boating offers unique rewards, it also requires more thorough preparation and respect for the dangers that cold temperatures pose. By dressing appropriately, preparing your vessel, and understanding the risks of cold-water immersion, you can safely enjoy the tranquility and beauty that off-season boating brings.

I hope that you have had the opportunity to enjoy a great summer and fall as we have, and we look forward to sharing sea stories with all of you at our next meeting. *Nick*

Radio Technical:

Marine VHF Radio Telephone:

New Marine VHF radio systems will soon display four-digit channel numbers. This change reflects US and International Telecommunication Union (ITU) channel standards and is different from the current channel indicator. Marine radio manufacturers are now producing VHF Radios with the new four-digit numbering system. Not all channels will have four digits. There is no operational impact to the changes in channel numbering. All two-digit indicators will remain the same, all designated uses remain the same, and all frequencies remain the same. The only real change you will notice is the use of the four-digit designation instead of the previous "A" designation. For further information see:

Important Reminder:

Any vessel equipped with a VHF marine radiotelephone (whether voluntarily or required) must maintain a watch on channel 16 (156.800 MHz) whenever the radiotelephone is not being used to communicate. **EXCEPTION TO ABOVE:**

As stated in the Navigation Rules, a VHF watch on Channel 16 (156.800Mhz) is **not** required on vessels subject to the Vessel Bridge-to-Bridge Radiotelephone Act **AND** participating in a Vessel Traffic Service (VTS) system when the watch is maintained on both the vessel bridge-to-bridge frequency and a designated VTS frequency.

Starlink:

The FCC has approved SpaceX request to increase power on two Starlink models. The increase in power will provide faster and more reliable service for users of two models, the "UT3-V1" and "UT3-V2," Starlink standard dish and portable Mini dish products. The FCC's approval also applies to stationery and in-motion use. FCC Chairman Brendan Carr stated: "We issued an order at the FCC that allows Starlink's direct-to-cell service to operate at higher power — enabling faster, more reliable, & innovative new services for consumers across the country. The FCC will continue the work of unleashing America's space economy." For further information see:

They joined in 1989 with their cabin cruiser, "Gull

Friend" and two little puppy dogs. They went on many weekend cruises and lots of the two-week rendezvous. Ray was a great storyteller and very smart. Ask him a question and be prepared for a very detailed answer. Those of us who went boating with them have great memories.

Ray took classes and got involved in many ways. He was Chaplain, chairman of Co-Op Charting, went up the bridge and became Commander in 2013. He was an encourager. As Co-Op Charting Chair he would schedule a project on the Snohomish River as it passes by the Everett Marina. Members would spend the day documenting the markers by boat in the river and along the beaches. The goal was to update the Port Gardener Bay nautical chart.

When boating got hard for several members of the squadron, they sold their cruisers and bought recreational vehicles and created the Highway Mariners group. Same adventures but on land and more often than not, near the water.

He later bought an Arima fishing boat, "Four Fifties" and went fishing and crabbing with his family. He and Elaine came to nearly all the General Meetings and visited with the other members and got to know them well. Many members will consider themselves "friends" of Ray and Elaine. These are just some of my memories of Ray.

There is a lovely obituary on the Solie Funeral Home website, and a Funeral Mass will be October 31 at 10:30am at St. Mary Magdalen Catholic Church. In lieu of flowers, they ask that you consider a donation to your local St. Vincent de Paul or Children's Hospital of Seattle.


